Our Program

Capital High School offers its students a standards based, learning environment where teachers guide and support our drop out recovery students as they work toward a high school diploma. Our team of Properly Licensed Teachers engage students in the curriculum and provide an engaging classroom where students succeed. Students can work at their pace to accelerate or get critical intervention for credit completion.

When a student enrolls at Capital High School, they participate in a critical evaluation of their academic abilities and learning skills/styles. This is used to create a tailored plan for learning. Past credits are included in the student's learning plan as are STAR test scores, career inventory results and other pertinent data so they receive a clear road map for graduation and beyond.

Our curriculum is mapped to Ohio's Learning Standards for all core courses. In addition, Capital uses supplemental curriculum materials, Ohio Means Jobs inventories and other career-based curriculum and experiences that support each student's life after graduation. School hours may also include work-based learning opportunities, job shadowing, internships, volunteer hours and certification classes. Our school was in attendance 173 days, 951.5hours of instructional time for the 2022-2023 Year.

Additional Instructional Programs

Capital High School is committed to providing quality educational services for all students. The delivery of special education services is aligned with the school's mission and goals. The Capital team works collaboratively to prepare each student to reach their full potential as contributing, successful members of their communities. We direct students to achieve academic skills while facilitating social and emotional development and career-based skills with the goal of producing lifelong learners. Capital provides Intervention Specialists, tutors and a Special Education Administrator; all of whom collaborate to meet the individual needs of students with disabilities. We serve cross-categorically and in a variety of settings with varying levels of support based on a student's individual need, including one-on-one and small group instruction. In addition, we use the MTSS process to ensure that interventions are provided in a timely and consistent manner to all students that need them. We are committed to the inclusion model of special education service delivery in order to meet least restrictive environment.

Capital goes beyond core curriculum instruction and individualizes learning with our career-based programs. We offer life skills and career readiness training to all student as part of the required coursework and help connect students to employment, work-based learning and volunteer opportunities. This includes job-seeking techniques, interview skills, resume writing and character education

Capital High School provides more than a high school diploma. We measure success not only by academic achievement, but also by our students' personal and professional growth. We inspire students to do their best - in the classroom and in the community.

The achievements of our students translates into more successful communities, because our graduates enter the workforce as prepared, civic-minded and productive members of society.

Graduation Rate

Capital High School offers students who are at-risk of dropping out, or who may have already dropped out of traditional high school, the opportunity to re-engage and earn a state-recognized diploma. Students who would otherwise opt for a diploma equivalent have the opportunity to graduate from Capital High School on time. The State of Ohio calculates the number of students who enter the 9th grade for the first time, adjusts for population, and formulates its projection of the number of students who actually earn a diploma four years later in determining a school's graduation rate. Based on the state's calculations, Capital High School 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th year graduation rates for the 2022-2023 school year are shown below. Capital High School continues to strive to increase that percentage every year and is proud of our results considering these students would not have graduated otherwise.
